SUPPORT CLEANING INGREDIENT DISCLOSURE IN MINNESOTA

Ingredient disclosure is required on food, drugs and cosmetics labels but not for cleaning products. This lack of transparency does not give consumers enough information to make informed decisions.

The cleaning product ingredient disclosure bill would require manufacturers to disclose cleaning product ingredients to consumers.

MAKE HOMEMADE CLEANERS

GENERAL PURPOSE CLEANER

16 oz. spray bottle
1/4 cup white vinegar
Water

Add vinegar to your spray bottle and fill the remainder of your bottle with water

FLOOR CLEANER (INCLUDING WOOD)

Use ½ cup vinegar per gallon of water.

DISHWASHER RINSE AIDE

Fill your dishwasher's rinse aide dispenser with vinegar for spot free dishes
